So please come along and give me something to scribble down on the day. Please..




Carolyn Merry, Director - Place for Hope

Her passion for peacemaking, in its most holistic sense, is deeply rooted in her Christian faith and experiences of living and working beside people with different faiths, cultures, beliefs, worldviews, and life experiences.

Key Note: "You have heard it said, but I say to you..."

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus both models and challenges us to use every opportunity in our lives for walking towards conflict for the purposes of making peace and reconciliation. Carolyn will help us explore what lessons we can draw from Jesus' teachings on conflict in the Sermon on the Mount, including the calling and confidence to address and embody conflict transformation and reconciliation in all aspects of the Church's ministry and mission, including through preaching and worship.



What were you arguing about along the way? We will be joined in a pre-recorded video by Pádraig Ó Tuama, a poet and theologian and former leader of the Corrymeella Community. 'What were you arguing about along the way' is a resource from the writers of www.SpiritualityofConflict.com Brought together by Pádraig Ó Tuama, the website is dedicated to reading the gospel texts through the lens of conflict and reading conflict through the lens of the gospel texts. Reflections are published for the gospel reading for every Sunday of the three-year lectionary cycle. The book 'What were they arguing about along the way' is a selection of these reflections in print – you can access them for free on the website. It is a fantastic free resource for Local Preachers and Worship Leaders.

Workshops

Workshop One with Carolyn Merry: The Sermon on the Mount: Jesus turns the tables on Fight or Flight being the only options to conflict. This interactive workshop will explore with participants what Jesus teaches us about non-violence as the way to transform conflict. Participants will look at specific examples of transforming conflict non-violently in the Sermon on the Mount and how these may be applied in our churches and worship today.



Workshop Two with Brec Seaton: The Conflict Puzzle. Interactively, we will explore what the jigsaw puzzle of conflict looks like and its relationship with the Bible and all things that cause us challenge within the life of the church – or at least some of them. Come along to consider how you might lead worship and preach using this simple illustration of the Conflict Puzzle. (Brec is a Learning & Development Officer with the Methodist Church, and a practitioner with Place for Hope.)

Workshop Three with Revd. Sheryl Anderson: This will be based on New Testament 30th October Lectionary Bible readings – details to follow.

Workshop Four with Jasmine Devadason: This will be based on the Old Testament 30th October Lectionary Bible readings – details to follow.

Workshop Five with Revd. Patrick Evans: This workshop will be offered to those joining us on Zoom and will be based on the writings of John Paul Lederach and the book 'Reconcile: Conflict Transformation for ordinary Christians' – details to follow.
